Headteacher's Headlines

Over the last two weeks something strange has been happening to the hall! Families have been sponsoring and decorating the floor to help us raise money to finish our hall refurbishment project. So far we have raised £3,790 which is 18% of our target of £20,400.

So far, the project has:

- Installed acoustic ceiling tiles and wall paneling.
- Redecorated.
- Installed AV equipment including a new projector, sound system and stage lighting.
- Purchased a new stage.
- Bought new chairs and tables.
- Created a backstage area for use during performances.



All of this has been paid for by the PTA, the School Trust Fund and the school. We would like to say a huge thank you to everyone who has helped us to get this far.

There are a few more things that we need to do to finish the project:

- Install new flooring.
- Purchase blinds for the windows.
- Replace the kitchen shutter.

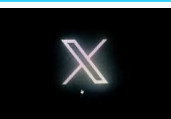
Can you help us to reach our target and complete the works at half term? You can help by sponsoring a tile or tiles and decorating them. Tiles cost £12 each or £50 for 5. There are approximately 2.5 tiles for every child in the school! The new floor will be laid on top so who knows, in 20 years' time, someone may uncover the hidden artwork!

Tiles can be purchased either in person by card, or via ScoPay to the Trust Fund. If you are a tax payer, we would encourage you donate via the Trust Fund and fill in a gift aid form (available [here](#)) so that we can also claim 25% tax back from the government on your donations.

The hall will be open for sponsors to make their donations and decorate their tiles from Friday 11 October to Thursday 24 October, every morning from 8.30am to 8.45am and every afternoon from 3.00pm to 3.30pm. If you drop off or collect at the West Gate, you are welcome to accompany your child to the hall at these times – please just speak to a member of staff at the gate. News In Brief

First Aid

If your child needs first aid treatment at school they will be taken to the first aid area in the school office. Guidance from the Department for Education requires us to telephone a parent/carer to inform them when a child in Reception (YR) has received any first aid treatment, however minor. Our policy states that:

'If a child in YR requires first aid, as a result of an accident or injury, the office will telephone a parent / carer as soon as reasonably practicable, and after any first aid treatment. A message will be left if there is no reply giving details of the injury and any first aid.'

Uniform

We have a school uniform and expect all children to wear it. Details of our uniform and where to order it are available on the school [website](#). Our uniform supplier is [Schoolwear Inc.](#)

Please remember to send your child in appropriate footwear. No open toed sandals, jelly shoes, crocs or heels and please do not provide lace up shoes before your child can tie them independently. If children come to school wearing trainers for any reason, other than for a medical reason, they will be required to change into school plimsols for the day.

Waterproof coats with a hood, should be in school every day for playtimes with all items clearly named. No tracking devices should be placed on your child or their belongings whilst they are in the care of Stamford Green.

Umbrellas are not permitted at school.

Water

The children need to bring a bottle of water to school to drink during the day. Bottles should be plastic and have a 'sports cap' in order to prevent spillages in the classroom. Please check our school uniform policy on the school website for more information.

It is essential that only plain water is brought in for this purpose. Other drinks, including flavoured waters, are not permitted.

Online Safety

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

"Inappropriate" means different things to different people. What's acceptable for one age group, for example, may be unsafe for a slightly younger audience. Online, young people can chance upon inappropriate content in various ways - from pop-up ads to TV fast videos. The increasingly young age at which children become active in the digital world heightens the risk of them innocently running into something that they find upsetting or frightening. Trusted adults need to be able to help children be aware of what to do if they're exposed to age-inappropriate content.

WHERE IS IT FOUND?

SOCIAL MEDIA
Age-inappropriate content is widely available on social media platforms. Facebook, for instance, is heavily targeted with young people but is arguably best known for being a social media platform where older people speak or provide advice to children and teenagers which could cause lasting damage to a child's emotional and mental health.

GAMING
Gaming is an enjoyable source of entertainment for children and teenagers. Sites can feature violence, horror, gambling or sexually explicit material. Playing games unsuitable for their age can encourage children to imitate what they see on screen, or 'chat' with other children and teenagers that you probably wouldn't want your child to see or speak to.

STREAMING
The range of video streaming services available to children and teenagers can find almost anything they want to watch on demand. Some services are at risk of allowing 11+ shows and movies which contain sexual and violent content. Children's TV channels, however, have strict guidelines about what content is suitable for children's viewing.

ADVERTS
Online adverts frequently include age-inappropriate content. They're designed to present things that interest children and teenagers, but it's important to be aware of what they see. TALK IT THROUGH
Embarrassment or fear of getting into trouble can make it difficult for children to talk openly about age-inappropriate content they've encountered. It's important to be open and honest about it, so they can talk to you about it. They'll be able to tell you what they've seen, and you can help them decide if they're safe. CONNECT, DON'T CORRECT
If your child's been particularly distressed by exposure to age-inappropriate content, it's important to be open and honest about it, so they can talk to you about it. They'll be able to tell you what they've seen, and you can help them decide if they're safe.

BLOCK, REPORT, CONTROL
After discussing the problem, you and your child can take steps together. This could include blocking any inappropriate sites and reporting any content which violates a platform's rules. It's important to be open and honest about it, so they can talk to you about it.

GET SPECIALIST HELP
Age-inappropriate content can potentially have a negative impact on a child's mental health, which is sometimes supported through changes to their behaviour. If the problem becomes more severe, they might consider seeing a professional. It's important to be open and honest about it, so they can talk to you about it.

Even though it's obviously difficult to stay calm in a situation where your child has been put at risk, it's essential to think before you speak. Your child may well have been upset by what they've seen, but it's important to be open and honest about it, so they can talk to you about it.

Attendance Reminder:

Just to remind Parents/Carers that if you take their children out of school without authority for 5 or more days (which do not have to be consecutive), then the following will apply:

1. If you have not incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children in a rolling 3 year period since 19 August 2024, then the penalty notice will be charged at the rate of £160.00, **per Parent/Carer per child**, if paid within 28 days. This will be reduced to £80.00 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.
2. If you have incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children since 19 August 2024, the rolling 3 year period will be activated from the date of the first penalty notice and the second penalty notice will be charged at the flat rate of £160.00, **per Parent/Carer per child**, if paid within 28 days. There will be no reduction for payment within 21 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.
3. If you have incurred 2 penalty notices relating to this child/children in the rolling 3 year period since the first penalty notice was issued, then you will NOT receive a third penalty notice – Surrey County Council will have no option but to consider a prosecution, **per Parent/Carer per child**, in the Magistrates Court under s 444 Education Act 1996.

ATTENDANCE WHAT THE NEW RULES MEAN FOR ME

1 I'm a single parent of one child and we want to go on holiday for a week.
Your holiday will not be authorised and you must talk to the school before you book anything. Because your child will miss 5 school days you will be given a penalty notice fine. The fine is £160 but if you pay it in 21 days it will be reduced to £80.

2 FOR EVERY CHILD A PENALTY IS GIVEN. **IRREGULAR ATTENDANCE 10 IN 10**
If your child is absent for 10 or more sessions in 10 weeks and their absences are unauthorised. The school will consider prosecution.
1 Day = 2 Sessions

3 FOR A FAMILY OF TWO PARENTS
4 children & 2 parents = **£1280**
Reduced to £640 if paid in 21 days

4 If in any period of not more than 3 years, your child has a 2nd and 3rd leave of absence or pattern of irregular attendance...
2ND TIME
2 parents and 1 child = £320
2 children = 640
3 children = 960
4 children = 1280
No discount for early payment
3RD TIME
A penalty notice fine will not be given. Instead, your case will be taken to court.
A magistrate can fine each parent £2500 for each child
1 parent & 4 children = £10,000
2 parents & 4 children = £20,000

School Governor's visit for Pupil Voice

As part of our ongoing efforts to ensure that our school remains a happy and supportive place for all pupils, the school governors conducted a 'Pupil Voice' visit at the end of last term. For those who may not be familiar with the term, Pupil Voice provides a platform for pupils to share their opinions, ideas, and experiences about school life as well as helping us to understand what works well and where we can improve. It's an essential part of our commitment to pupil wellbeing and continuous improvement; and also one of the highlights of the year for governors as it provides a unique opportunity to engage directly and hear from pupils.

During our visit, governors met with groups of children from both Key Stages 1 and 2 to ask about their views on various aspects of school life including the curriculum, behaviour, well-being and the school environment. The sessions were relaxed and friendly, and the children were very enthusiastic about sharing their thoughts.

The children provided valuable feedback about their school experiences. Across both key stages, pupils spoke about their enjoyment of a variety of subjects with Art & PE particularly popular. On well-being, it was reassuring to hear that the children felt confident they could talk to their teachers if they had any worries, could use the worry box and that they felt supported at school. The children clearly love the school environment with several enthusiastic comments about the 'loose parts' exploration play area and Crinkle Crag Climber.

We were impressed with the children's engagement and honesty during the sessions. Their insights will help guide us in making improvements, ensuring that all pupils feel safe, supported, and happy at school.
