Later on in this newsletter Mrs Vidal has written about the successes we are seeing thanks to the introduction of the One Minute Reads fluency activity.

I thought it worth sharing the image below with you, as it highlights why we focus on the children being secure in knowing, and recalling their multiplication facts. Our [Maths Compendium](#) highlights which times tables are introduced in Y2 with them all being known by Y4. For children in YR to Y2, the focus is on the foundational skills that lead on to times tables and the Weekly Information will help you know the focus for each week. All the teachers want to say thank you for your support with homework and helping your child to learn these key skills.

fractions

- adding and subtracting fractions: $\frac{2}{3} + \frac{1}{3} = \frac{3}{3} = 1$, $\frac{10}{15} + \frac{12}{15} = \frac{22}{15}$

I've always wondered

We are writing to confirm that Holiday Meal Vouchers for pupils eligible for benefit-related Free School Meals will continue to be provided for the upcoming school holiday periods – October half term 2025, Christmas 2025, and February half term 2026.

Due to a 12% reduction in the Household Support Fund (HSF) allocation and an increase in the number of eligible children and families, the voucher amount will however be reduced as follows:

- October half term 2025 – £10 per child
- Christmas holidays 2025 – £20 per child
- February half term 2026 – £10 per child

We are sharing this information now to support your planning for these holiday periods. We understand this change may be disappointing for families, and we appreciate your continued support in helping us communicate this with sensitivity.

While the reduction in HSF is a national issue, and many councils across the country have had to reduce or stop their holiday voucher schemes altogether, Surrey County Council remains committed to continuing this support for families through to February half term.

Online Safety

Important Safeguarding Notice: Children's "Spy" Books

We want to make you aware of a recent issue affecting some popular children's books by Andrew Cope, including the *Spy Dogs*, *Spy Cats*, and *Spy Pups* series.

Some editions of these books include a printed web address at the back. This link used to go to the author's website, but the domain is no longer under his control. It has since been taken over by another party and now leads to inappropriate adult content.

The publisher, Puffin, has paused sales and distribution of the books and is working with schools, libraries, and retailers to remove copies from circulation. They have stressed that the website has no connection to the author or publisher.

What this means for you:

- If your child has any *Spy Dog*, *Spy Cat* or *Spy Pups* books at home, please check the back for website links and make sure they do not try to visit the site. It is safe for children to continue reading the stories themselves — the concern is only with the outdated link.
- We recommend talking with your child about the importance of not following web addresses in books without checking with an adult first.
- We have hidden the website address in the copies at school and will continue to share updates from the publisher as more information becomes available.

TOGETHERNESS

Attendance Reminder:

Just to remind Parents/Carers that if you take their children out of school without authority for 5 or more days (which do not have to be consecutive), then the following will apply:

1. If you have not incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children in a rolling 3 year period since 19 August 2024, then the penalty notice will be charged at the rate of £160.00, **per Parent/Carer per child**, if paid within 28 days. This will be reduced to £80.00 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.
2. If you have incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children since 19 August 2024, the rolling 3 year period will be activated from the date of the first penalty notice and the second penalty notice will be charged at the flat rate of £160.00, **per Parent/Carer per child**, if paid within 28 days. There will be no reduction for payment within 21 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against you in the Magistrates Court.
3. If you have incurred 2 penalty notices relating to this child/children in the rolling 3 year period since the first penalty notice was issued, then you will NOT receive a third penalty notice – Surrey County Council will have no option but to consider a prosecution, **per Parent/Carer per child**, in the Magistrates Court under s 444 Education Act 1996.

ATTENDANCE WHAT THE NEW RULES MEAN FOR ME

1 I'm a single parent of one child and we want to go on holiday for a week.
Your holiday will not be authorised and you must talk to the school before you book anything. Because your child will miss 5 school days you will be given a penalty notice fine. The fine is £160 but if you pay it in 21 days it will be reduced to £80.

2 FOR EVERY CHILD A PENALTY IS GIVEN. **IRREGULAR ATTENDANCE 10 IN 10**
If your child is absent for 10 or more sessions in 10 weeks and their absences are unauthorised. The school will consider prosecution. **1 Day = 2 Sessions**

3RD TIME
A penalty notice fine will not be given. Instead, your case will be taken to court. A magistrate can fine each parent £2500 for each child
1 parent & 4 children = £10,000
2 parents & 4 children = £20,000

Surrey County Council is not responsible for authorising pupil absence and therefore cannot withdraw any Penalty Notice requests without the written permission of the Headteacher.

READING



As you know we have been focusing on developing reading fluency by including 'One Minute Reads' as part of the homework in Years 2 to 6. It has been fantastic to see how the children have embraced this new challenge, and great to hear that they are enjoying seeing their progress each week.

Remember – reading fluency is made up of **pace** (speed), **accuracy** and **prosody** (expression and phrasing). Although we measure speed, the teachers are looking for expression which shows good understanding.

At teacher meeting this week we talked about how 'One Minute Reads' are going and the teachers talked about how impressed they have been when the class reads the text together at the end of the week. One teacher said that the expression was so good "It was like watching a show!"

Well done for all your hard work - keep up the practice and you'll get even better!

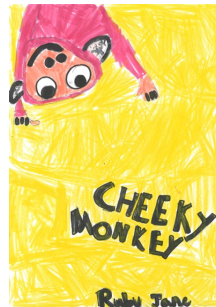


Above and Beyond

Pupil Voice Questionnaire

During the last week of Summer term, myself and another parent Governor (Vicky Sumner), had the opportunity to speak to a range of pupils from Year 1, Year 2 and Year 3. We asked the children several questions about their day-to-day life at Stamford Green.

The children told us how they really enjoyed the new equipment on the top field and how this now gives everyone the opportunity to partake in different activities and make-believe games. They thoroughly enjoyed subjects like science, where they got to experiment with hands on equipment,; music, where they got to learn to play a range of different musical instruments like the recorder and history, where the pupils got to imagine different time periods through the themed dress up days they had. All the children could name the values of the school and understood what they could do if someone was being unkind to them. Worry boxes and behaviour forms were spoken about and the children mentioned behaviour buddies and the different roles of children in the playground. All the children we spoke to (random sample) felt safe at school and knew who they could speak to if they had any worries or concerns.

The children were all extremely polite, well-mannered and confident - a real credit to the school and to their families too. They were a pleasure to speak to and absolutely loved their life at Stamford Green.

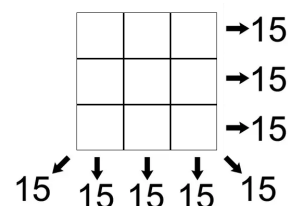

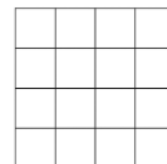

Magic Squares!

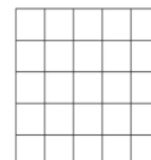

Each year, during the summer term, we are required to administer statutory assessments to children in Year 1, Year 4 and Year 6. The outcomes of these assessments will be shared with parents and carers alongside the annual report at the end of the year. Please click on any of the links below to find out information about any of these statutory assessments.

Year 1 children will take part in the [Phonics Screening Check](#). The purpose of the check is to ensure that all children have learned phonic decoding to an age appropriate standard. From Reception, when children start to learn to read using our phonics scheme 'Read Write Inc', children are well prepared with their phonic decoding skills and are able to read words accurately.

Year 4 children will take the [Multiplication Check](#). The purpose of this check is to ensure that children fluently know their tables up to 12 x 12, which is essential for future success in maths. Multiplicative content makes a significant portion of GCSE maths. Knowing their times tables really does prepare the children for their future learning and enables them to access it much easier.

At the end of Year 6, the children will take the [National Curriculum Tests](#) in reading, grammar, punctuation, spelling and maths. The tests help to measure attainment of pupils in relation to the standards set out in the National Curriculum. In addition to the tests, teachers will make an assessment of the children's writing based on their work throughout the year.

Throughout the year, teachers will be ensuring that the children are well prepared to succeed in these assessments and will update Weekly Information about how you can help your child further at home.

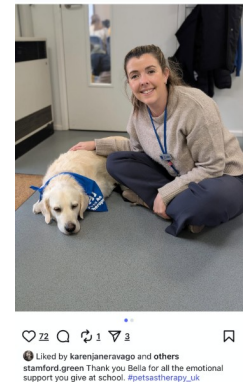

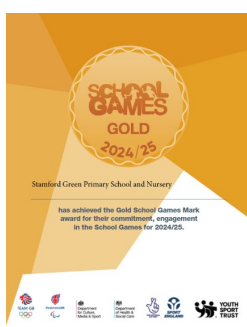

This award, run by the Youth Sport Trust on behalf of the Government, celebrates schools that encourage sport, competition and healthy activity both in school and across the community.



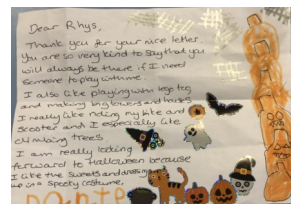
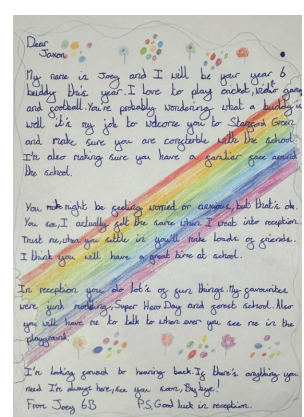

LEARNING

October is Black History Month in the UK. A time set aside each year to celebrate the achievements of Black people in the past and today. The history of people with Black heritage is part of the history that we study all year round. Black History Month is an opportunity for all of us to learn more about significant Black and Mixed Heritage people and their contributions to Britain and the world. We are celebrating Black History in our DEIB assemblies by learning about the important contributions Black people have made to our culture and society.

Professor Dame Elizabeth Anionwu (1947-)

- Elizabeth Anionwu is a British nurse, professor and campaigner.
- In 1979, she became the first **sickle cell disease** nurse specialist and started the first UK Sickle & Thalassaemia Screening and Counselling Centre.
- After retirement, she spent years campaigning for a statue of the nurse, Mary Seacole, to be built. It was built in 2016 outside St Thomas' Hospital, London and became the first statue dedicated to a Mixed Heritage woman in Britain.

Sickle cell disease - A blood condition particularly common in people from African or Caribbean backgrounds.

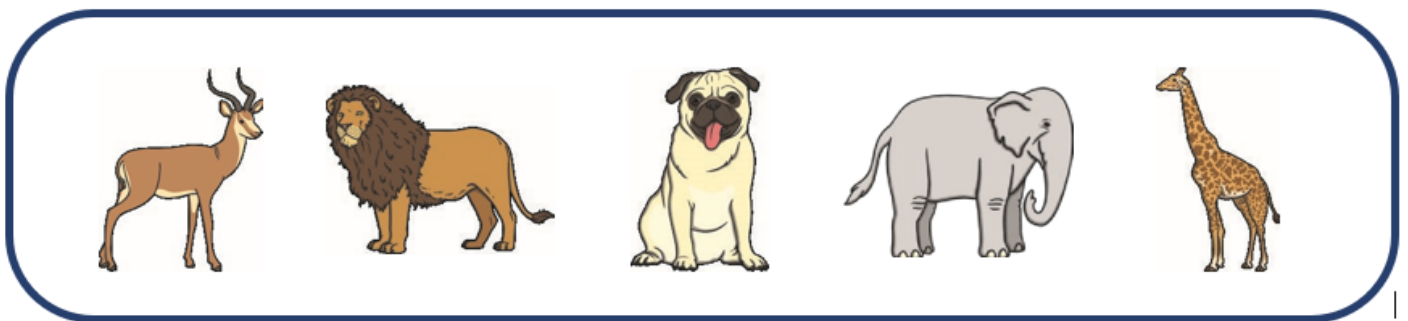
